<u>Chrístmas Greetíngs</u>

I'm with my mother in St. Vincent's, Dungarvan Community Hospital, as I begin this note on Tuesday afternoon, 29th November. She is quiet, and I take out my laptop to begin these greetings to you. A year ago, I was in dread of being off the road. Since March 1st when the driving disqualification took effect, I've learned that the bike is far better than I had thought. I can get around the county, but it takes longer, and I can carry less. I've been wet and cold, and cough and sneeze more than before. I've splashed out on waterproof jackets and trousers, even wearing wellingtons on really wet days. You have been so generous with lifts, and the experience as a passenger chatting with various drivers, has been enlightening and intimate. Thank you. And of course, there have been many times when I stayed at home due to logistical complications, which in itself is no bad thing.

Bishop Martin Drennan, being waked today and buried tomorrow in Galway Cathedral, looms large. While my Old Testament teacher in Maynooth, it was as Spiritual Director that he influenced me more than I realise. 'Well how are things?' he casually began our first session. Thinking it to be a preamble before getting to the serious stuff, I muttered half under my breath, 'grand, if only I could get on the hurling team!' Anger and ego emerged as issues needing my attention, elicited almost before we were even sitting down. Always alert, open and ready to follow wherever I wished to explore, and able to help me unearth the key building or stumbling blocks towards maturing. Never intrusive, but wise and attuned to human experience. A great guide. Last April I sat close to him, due to Parkinson's a physically crumbled version of the fit man I used to know, at the installation of his second successor. Hoping to have a word after the ceremony, he was wheeled away before I could make my move. In truth, it was he who helped me to embark on the arduous but enriching inward odyssey to feelings, both long buried and newly born.

Two days ago, on Sunday afternoon my youngest niece and nephews kept me on my toes. We talked about the Late Late Toy Show, and I tempted fate by asking them to read my sermon for that day which had featured the Toy Show. Conor the eleven-year-old elder read, the younger two listened intently. Darragh, a Liverpool fan, first objected that I had mentioned Jack Dwan from the Burgery and not Caoimhín Kelleher the Merseyside goalkeeper, both of whom had made a guest appearance! More crucially, the First Communicant continued to challenge, 'why are you talking about the Toy Show, and not God and Jesus?' Out of the mouths of babes. How could I do an impromptu Sunday School catechesis in my kitchen and explain that I am more concerned with where and how we can encounter the God of Jesus in this day and age, than with how he was experienced two thousand years ago. My interest in the historical birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus is mainly to shine a light on our religious experience now.

Insofar as we know, Jesus didn't dive down from on high to planet Earth in a spaceship but like you and I was born of a woman, reared in a family, community and culture; he learned to live and love from those around him, as well from handed-down wisdom condensed in Holy Books and religious rituals. My impulsive godson Darragh was right. We need to tell the story of Jesus and God, Mary and Joseph, the stable, animals, shepherds, wise men, Herod...the poverty and precariousness of the infant King of the Jews, the lowly Lord of Life. But in telling the story, we need to interpret and translate it for our time and place. In this truest, deepest sense, Christmas is coming.

I love hearing stories of Jesus being born and reborn in boys and girls, mammies and daddies, and in crusty old bachelors like me. As I sit with my mother, spooning soup between her lips or pouring tea from a beaker...how quickly I'm brought back long before I remember to when she spoon-fed me. No one said it would be easy. Once a man and twice a child indeed. To see your lifetime rock crumble, though natural, is hard but softened somewhat by the heroic helpfulness, warmth and sensitive care of hospital staff.

Christmas, in all sorts of pleasant or unpleasant circumstances, calls us to be open to the birth of new possibilities, and God touching and taking hold in the most vulnerable insides we never knew we had. Be it birth or bereavement, marriage or separation, health and good fortune or illness and suffering...Christ and Christmas open us to fresh beginnings and raw feelings of hope in despair, inner peace amidst difficulties. Could we continue here with the celebration night?? And put the photograph in of everyone celebrating?


